Also, in light of the Breonna Taylor case, my work is even more important to me. I want my art to represent who I am and I want the people that view my art to know this was created by a Black womxn.

If you aren't familiar about the term "womxn" and "womanism", it's basically the more inclusive version of feminism. Womanism focuses on race, gender, and class and feminism focuses on soley gender. Throughout history, the faces of feminism were often white women. The term "womxn" is also used as way to include non-bianary and transgender people as well as to separate from the sexism that comes from the derived spelling with the word "men".

All of my pieces emphasize the beauty and uniqueness of Black womxn. I intentionally made them the focus point because the complexity of Black womxn are frequently in the background. My work is all about representation so I wanted to recognize differences in many ways. I have pieces that highlight vitiligo, natural bodies, different skin tones, natural hairstyles, non-European facial features, and many more to come. Along with representation I continued to use materials that make my art give a more glamorous feel. I regularly incorporate metallics, diamonds, jewelry, and metallic foils. I think my use of eye-catching materials intensifies the natural beauty that Black womxn radiate.
